PLANNING PRINCIPLES FOR MILITARY RELIEF ACTIVITIES


- MINUSTAH Guidance Note on Military Activities:
 - Recalls key principles for UN activities (humanitarian, civil-military cooperation....)
 - Clarifies the responsibilities and roles of military in support of relief activities
 - Situates military relief activities within existing coordination structures

COORDINATION MECHANISMS FOR RAPID RESPONSE & COMMUNITY IMPACT (POST-OPERATIONS)

- International Task Force and Government Task Force in Red Zones developing a single integrated plan (Gov't, MINUSTAH military & civilian, donors, UN agencies & NGO's)
- Military projects planned in coordination with Civil Affairs



RED ZONES TASK-FORCE







BARRIERS



- Strength of the armed groups (political position in 2006)
- Over populated areas (risk of collateral damage)
- Need for Immediate Relief Actions (IRA)
- Lack of military budgets to IRA
- Slowness to integrate the overall mission activities just after security operations
- Need to solicit external funding to support activities
- Heavy bureaucracy to administer funds
- Slow re-entry of humanitarian & development actors
- Absence of the State
- Lack of government resources and capacity
- Socio-cultural attitudes & practices
